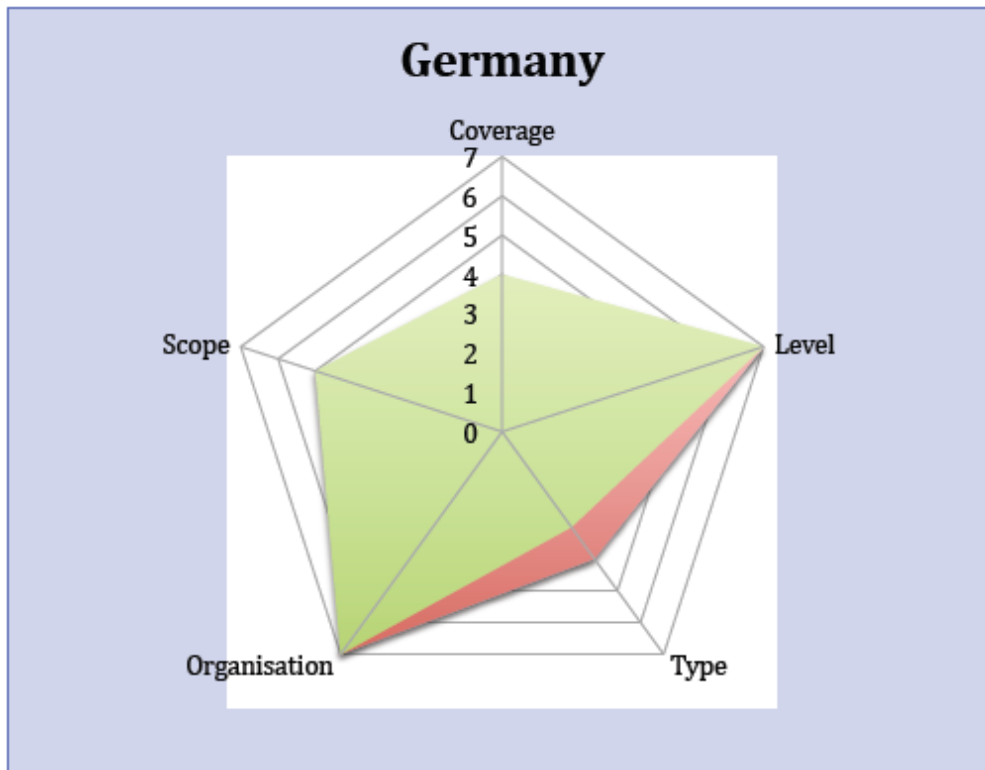

### 6 – Comments:

Germany does not have a national law that governs the Outdoors in terms of safety. No national, sector based programme safety measure has been found either. Furthermore, it is very difficult to find German stakeholders in the field of the outdoors.

Similarly to Austria, safety measures are taken regionally or locally with a strong input from federations.

The German approach is therefore based on measures taken for the sub-sectors and mainly for the activities on a local/regional base.

Safety issues in the Outdoors seem to be left very much down to the individual companies as far as management, staff training and customer information are concerned. As far as management of the environment and equipment safety are concerned the European and world conventions and standards seem to be strongly promoted by the German Institute for Normalisation (DIN).

The overall effectiveness of measures related to safety of outdoor leisure activities in Germany corresponds to pattern N°4.
